# After five months, reef life abour

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Scientists have discovered new life under the waters off Sidney.

A crew of abalone, starfish and possibly octopus have invaded five months after workers deployed a consortium of 270 concrete blocks off the pier near Sidney Hotel.

The nearly one-metre diameter blocks, making up the artificial reef look like concrete igloos peppered with holes.

City workers dropped the concrete forms to a 10-metre depth on the sea between two 190-metre swaths, running parallel and south and north of the pier.

Scientists were not sure if the concrete forms would attract marine life, but all doubt has since vanished.

Diver Jim Rice said in the last six weeks, the hollow concrete balls have become barely recognizable because of the abundant marine growth.
