Keynote speakers already confirmed include Linda Greenlaw and Olympic Gold Medalist-turned Clean Ocean activist Joan Benoit-Samuelson. The call for presenters has sounded. Proposals are due March 1st. Right now registration looks like it will land between \$350-400. Lodging options are available from \$55-\$85/night for a dorm room and \$139/night at the


The Annual Conference in Naples was the focus of the meeting and quite a few things were hashed out and finalized. The Board and the

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NEW INFORMAL EDUCATION CERTIFICATE PROGRAM AT USF

In September of 2006 the University of South Florida (USF) College of Education and the Center for Ocean Sciences Education Excellence (COSEE) collaborated to form an Informal Science Institutions Marine and Environmental Education Certificate Program. The program consists of four courses spread over a two-year period. The credits earned can be transferred to graduate programs at a number of institutions, like USF College of Education. The class is comprised of professionals from informal science institutions such as Mote Marine Laboratory, The Pier Aquarium, The Florida Aquarium, and Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, as well as students and teachers from institutions such as USF College of Marine Science, Campbell Park Elementary and the Pinellas County School System.

While I knew the basics behind the program, I had no idea what I was getting into when I registered for the first class! As it turned out, the first course, "Community Resources for Environmental Education" allowed us to form bonds with other informal science

institutions, make connections with the formal school systems, provide a place to express concerns and ideas for improvement, and tap into local and national resources in the fields of science, math, technology and engineering. Although some reorganization took place during the first semester - to be expected from a new program - we are on track this semester to continue learning from each other. We also look to gain knowledge into the way people learn and make meaning out of science by exploring questions, like "what is science?," "how can informal institutions aid formal institutions when it comes to teaching about science?," and "how exactly do people learn?" We might not be able to find the perfect solution to every challenge we address, but we are certainly working together to refine our collective ideas for the betterment of all.

MANDARIN HS PROJECT REMEMBERS LOCAL DIVER

In a seven-year project to create artificial reefs for offshore Northeast Florida fishing and diving spots, marine science students at Mandarin High School made six Reef Balls, one of which included the cremated remains of a well-known local commercial diver.

After a tragic diving accident claimed the life of 40 year-old diver "Capt. Bill" Newman, the family contacted the marine science department at Mandarin High School and made a request for Newman's ashes to be interred in one of the Reef Balls. Having filled a similar request once before project director Lex Waters and marine science teacher Jennifer Oglesby were more than happy

to oblige. Arrangements were made with Tarmac America, Inc., which has been donating concrete since the project began back in 1999, for the first load

of concrete for the current school year. MHS then in turn contacted the family so they could bring the ashes to the school to make them become a permanent part of a Reef Ball.

When the Tarmac truck arrived, the students began the

task of making the Reef Balls while the ashes were added to the concrete and poured into one of two of the larger Ultre Balls. A plaque will be commissioned by the family to later be attached to "their" Reef Ball, and in the notto-distant future, the Reef Balls will be taken offshore and added to one of the existing permitted sites off either St. Johns or Flagler County. Plans will be made to get the current group of Reef



Balls added to the High School Reef off St. Augustine if it can be arranged with the Parks and Recreation Department in St. Augustine.



FMSEA Conference, April 27 - 29, 2007 Naples, FL Field Trips Friday April 27

Field trips are on Friday April 27, 2007. **Morning and Full Day trips include box lunch**. Times indicate beginning to end time from La Quinta Inn & Suites. Transportation will be provided unless otherwise noted.

A. 8:00 AM - 12:00 PM Audobon's Corkscrew Swamp Sanctuary

Difficulty: Moderate - approximately 2-3 mile walk depending on personal choice

Minimum participants: 5 Maximum: 20

Fee: \$35

Corkscrew Swamp has been described as the largest old growth cypress forest in North America. Join interpreters for a guided tour on their boardwalk. A variety of birds, as well as native orchids, are treasures found on this site in addition to a number of trees more than 500 years old! Lunch will be provided.

B. 8:30 AM - 12:30 PM Kayak Tour of Johnson Bay

Difficulty: Easy to moderate

Minimum participants: 10 Maximum: 20

Fee: \$55

Join Rookery Bay's Dr. Geoff Trager and Cyril Marks on a paddle of the backwaters of Johnson Bay. Tour includes mangrove island exploration and an innovative approach to collecting plankton for the classroom. Lunch and kayak rental included.

C. 8:30 AM - 12:30 PM Tigertail Beach and Burrowing Owl Tour

Difficulty: Easy, though involves walking on beach/mudflats and periods of standing

Minimum participants: 5 Maximum: 20

Fee: \$25

Take a nice morning stroll along the shallow lagoon that is Tigertail Beach and Sand Dollar Island Critical Wildlife Area. Low tides bring in a variety of wading birds, including roseate spoonbills, white morphs of reddish egrets and more. A tour will be led by Randy McCormick, Education Coordinator at Rookery Bay National Estuarine Research Reserve, and Charlotte Roman, President of the Friends of Tigertail. After the beach walk, participants will hear about another of Marco Island's avian residents - the burrowing owl - and hopefully see some in their remaining habitat. Lunch will be provided.

D. 1:00 - 5:00 PM Rookery Bay Tour and Trawl

Difficulty: Easy to moderate, depending on weather conditions

Minimum participants: 8 Maximum: 15

Fee: \$25 includes lunch

Meet a polka-dot batfish up close! Join Dave Graff, Rookery Bay Education Specialist, on board a mullet skiff for a tour of some of the backwater bays and a short trawl. Critters from the murky depths of Rookery Bay will be explained and examined on the boat, then released. This is a truly hands-on experience! A short tour of a barrier island may be available, time permitting.

E. 1:00 – 5:00 PM Panther Refuge Swamp Buggy Tour

Difficulty: Easy; some walking. Be prepared for heat and/or bugs.

Minimum participants: 6 Maximum: 12

Fee: \$25

Half the group will climb aboard an official U.S. Government swamp buggy for a behind the scenes tour of the USFWS Panther Refuge, while the other half of the group will be on a short walking tour of an area not yet open to the public. Although the chance of spotting a panther is rare even here, who can pass up the opportunity to ride on a swamp buggy? Groups will switch halfway through the afternoon.

F. 1:00 – 5:00 PM Kayak Tour of Johnson Bay

Difficulty: Easy to moderate


