



County receives \$25,000 reef grant

At its special meeting May 21, the Walton County Board of County Commissioners learned the county had received a \$25,000 grant to build an artificial reef in waters off the county, near Seagrove Beach. The grant was funded by the Marine Resources Conservation Trust Fund through the Office of Fisheries Management and Assistance Services.

The grant process started nearly a year ago with voluntary scuba divers surveying bottom sites for a location. Of the sites surveyed, several were rejected because of a lack of benthic beneath the sand to support the reef material.

The material will be six-foot wide and four feet high hollow concrete balls, each weighing about 500 pounds. Over a five year period, the county hopes to place 210 of the concrete balls to form the reef. They will be placed in groups of 20 with each group at least 100 feet apart.

The grant the county received is for one year. County Administrative Supervisor Ronni Bell said the county will have to reapply each year for additional funds under the program. Bell and District 5 Commissioner Bo Cuchens noted Grayson Beach resident Van Scott Butler was instrumental in securing the county with the grant.
